This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

KS3 pupils receive 50 minutes per week for curriculum music, KS4 pupils receive 150 minutes per week of music for optional GCSE music; KS5 pupils receive 300 minutes per week of music for optional RSL music level music.

It is also worth noting:

• the school music curriculum is informed by the <u>model music curriculum</u> (March 2021) and non-statutory guidance for teaching music from Key Stages 1 to 3.

• the school is in partnership with Lancashire Music Service to support curriculum music. They provide the school with peripatetic staff.

Part B: Wider curriculum music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

The school offers peripatetic music tuition for guitar, bass guitar, drums, piano and singing outside of what is taught in lesson time, including one-to-one and small-group lessons. The tuition is free for those with pupil premium eligibility and other parents or families with special circumstances may have fees subsidised.

Pupils can join the following outside of what is taught in lesson time:

Year 7 choir

Full school choir

Keyboard club

Flute choir

Guitar club

Ukulele club

Pupils can make progress in music outside of lesson time by taking advantage of instrument loans and after-school provision such as choir

Pupils at Alder Grange can rehearse or practice individually or in groups in one of the 2 music rooms or 2 practice rooms.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

The musical experiences planned for the academic year 2025/26 will include:

- Music Tech house competition
- termly whole school assembly musical performances
- annual school production ('Into the Woods' December 2025) at the school
- GCSE/A level recital evening (audience)
- Easter Music Evening
- Summer music concert

All pupils from all year groups are encouraged to participate as performers, backstage and audience members.

In the future

Planned improvements for subsequent years in curriculum music, wider curriculum music and musical experiences are:

- expansion of wider curriculum groups to include more orchestral type and rock/pop groups
- attendance at live music events to enhance curriculum knowledge
- KS4/5 pupils involved with our feeder primary schools

Further information
